WELCOME TO MASS! This Sunday, the Second Sunday in Ordinary Time, is the Day of Prayer for Peace, and is observed throughout the Universal Church. There is much conflict and war as we begin this New Year. Let us beseech the Lord for peace and the transformation of human hearts.

This Thursday is also the first day of the Octave of Prayer for Christian Unity. We pray for a growth in the unity of faith and service among different Christian communities — especially here in Banbury - and for closer bonds of communion among Catholics.

It was sad to see the Christmas trees make their exit from church after the liturgical end of Christmastide – central heating doesn't always do them great favours! However, the Crib will remain in place until the old end of Christmastide on February 2nd – Candlemas, or the Feast of the Presentation.

It's a strange phenomenon that some people seem obsessed with the correct date for taking Christmas decorations down, but not nearly so obsessed with the correct date for putting them up — often appearing before Advent!! Interestingly, English Heritage in recent years had a push to get people to observe the traditional day for moving Christmas greenery from our homes and churches - Candlemas Day!

Down with the rosemary, and so Down with the bays and mistletoe; Down with the holly, ivy, and all Wherewith ye dressed the Christmas hall.

So if your decorations are still up brightening dark January – don't worry. The Crib (and the tree by it) in the presbytery will be there until Candlemas!

THE VISITATION OF THE ARCHBISHOP OF BIRMINGHAM

Archbishop Bernard Longley will be visiting the Parish on Sat 27 & Sun 28 January. Over that weekend, he would like to meet as many parishioners as possible. In order to do that, he will be present at all the Sunday Masses. In addition, there will be three extra events.

Sat 27 Jan - 5.30pm: Meeting at St Joseph's (for an hour or so).

Over the past few months there has been the Synod in Rome. But closer to home, there has been both Deanery meetings and a Parish meeting about the Diocesan Vision. This will be an opportunity for the Archbishop to reflect with us as we seek to proclaim the Gospel in the challenges the Church faces in our own day. The Diocesan Vision is focused on four themes:

- 1) Evangelisation
- 2) Formation (the deepening of faith of Catholics)
- 3) Liturgy and Worship
- 4) Social Outreach

1 Samuel 3:3-10,19

Eli said, 'I did not call. Go back and lie down.' So he went and lay down. Once again the Lord called, 'Samuel! Samuel!' Samuel got up and went to Eli and said, 'Here I am, since you called me.' He replied, 'I did not call you, my son; go back and lie down.' Samuel had as yet no knowledge of the Lord and the word of the Lord had not yet been revealed to him. Once again the Lord called, the third time. He got up and went to Eli and said, 'Here I am, since you called me.' Eli then understood that it was the Lord who was calling the boy, and he said to Samuel, 'Go and lie down, and if someone calls say, "Speak, Lord, your servant is listening."' So Samuel went and lay down in his place.

The Lord then came and stood by, calling as he had done before, 'Samuel! Samuel!' Samuel answered, 'Speak, Lord, your servant is listening.'

Samuel grew up and the Lord was with him and let no word of his fall to the ground.

Second reading

1 Corinthians 6:13-15,17-20

The body is not meant for fornication: it is for the Lord, and the Lord for the body. God, who raised the Lord from the dead, will by his power raise us up too.

You know, surely, that your bodies are members making up the body of Christ; do you think I can take parts of Christ's body and join them to the body of a prostitute? Never! But anyone who is joined to the Lord is one spirit with him.

Keep away from fornication. All the other sins are committed outside the body; but to fornicate is to sin against your own body. Your body, you know, is the temple of the Holy Spirit, who is in you since you received him from God. You are not your own property; you have been bought and paid for. That is why you should use your body for the glory of God.

Gospel John 1:35-42

As John stood with two of his disciples, Jesus passed, and John stared hard at him and said, 'Look, there is the lamb of God.' Hearing this, the two disciples followed Jesus. Jesus turned round, saw them following and said, 'What do you want?' They answered, 'Rabbi,' — which means Teacher — 'where do you live?' 'Come and see' he replied; so they went and saw where he lived, and stayed with him the rest of that day. It was about the tenth hour.

One of these two who became followers of Jesus after hearing what John had said was Andrew, the brother of Simon Peter. Early next morning, Andrew met his brother and said to him, 'We have found the Messiah' — which means the Christ — and he took Simon to Jesus. Jesus looked hard at him and said, 'You are Simon son of John; you are to be called Cephas' — meaning Rock.
