

On this, the first Sunday of Lent, the Gospel reading recalls Jesus' temptation in the desert. According to St Mark's Gospel, the Spirit drove Jesus into the desert, where he was tempted by Satan for forty days. Jesus spent 40 days in the desert, which is noteworthy. This commemorates the 40 years that the Israelites journeyed in the desert after being freed from slavery in Egypt. The prophet Elijah also travelled through the desert for 40 days and nights, arriving at Horeb, the mountain of God, where he was attended to by an angel of the Lord. To remember the significance of these events, we set aside 40 days for the season of Lent. Note that in Mark's Gospel, the desert marks the beginning of Jesus' battle with Satan. Similarly, our Lenten observances are merely the beginning, preparing for and reinforcing our ongoing battle to resist the challenges and temptations we experience in our daily lives. During Lent, the Holy Spiritleads us, only if we are receptive, to remember our Baptismal promises, in which we promised to reject sin and follow Jesus. God, like the angels who tended to Jesus in the wilderness, sustains us in our everyday struggles and temptations. His help we can find in the Eucharist, sacrament of reconciliation, meditation of God's Words, charitable life, prayer and in Jesus' victory over sin and death on the cross. Let us be open and allow the Holy Spirit work in us. When faced with temptations and/or struggles this Lent, remember you are not alone, when struggling, read some of your bible, say the Rosary, come to Church for one of the daily Masses, Eucharistic Adoration, Divine Mercy, Confessions, Stations of the Cross and be guided in sustaining your every day

Health & Safety and Church Maintenance

As some of you may be aware we have a leak around the confessionals, choir loft and the main Spire of the Church, along with dripping gutters, we have been in liaison with the Archdiocese and have awarded a contractor to undertake initial works on the Church roof who have experience of working on and in Churches. This will start on week commencing Monday 26th February, they will keep disruption to absolute minimum and all Church Services will continue as normal including Adoration on the Monday as these works are external. However please be mindful of these works being undertaken taking extra caution where necessary, if you have any concerns then please do not hesitate to contact me or the parish office.

Some of you may have noticed that the higher areas of our Church are in need of a deep clean, this is extremely evident on the High Altar but also on the Sanctuary as large amounts of dust falls, we are now looking to receive quotations for specialist cleaners to undertake this work who are not only respectful of working in a Church but also sensitive to the fabrics and materials that make up our beautiful Church, the High Altar and paintings etc. If you know any companies who may wish to quote, please do let me know sol can include them.

Our Quinquennial Inspection will be undertaken this June on the Church, Coach House and Hibberts Hall. This inspection will survey the buildings and tell us of any immediate works necessary and forecast any works that may need to be undertaken within the next five years. As you may be aware our buildings are listed and lay within a conservation area and so those awarded the survey will be suitably qualified but unfortunately this adds to the costs. As you may have noticed a few defaults with our sound system, one being the mobile microphone used during Masses and Funerals has not been used due to it breaking due to its age and wear and tear. Additionally, the sound levels are something we constantly monitor as on occasion you will have heard the feedback when the readings are being said from the Lectern, therefore we have had sound engineers out recently to assess our system, microphones and speakers, we now await this quotation.

We are also undertaking a review of our CCTV and the potential need for greater CCTV on the Church grounds, again if you know of any companies that may wish to work with us please do let me know.

Unfortunately, all these repairs and maintenance comes at a cost, therefore if anyone has experience of grants and writing bids or feels this is something they would like to learn more about and would like to donate your time to help then please do get in touch with me, you can get me on the email on the front page of the newsletter or I am at the weekend masses and always open for a chat. If anyone would like to step forward with fund raising ideas and lead a group of fundraisers, who not only help the Church with money but also bring us all together as a Parish we need your help and would like to hear from you, please speak

Feast of the Cell

The 20th of February is one of the most special days in what we might call the Rosminian Calendar. The Feast of the Cell commemorates the location where Blessed Antonio Rosmini began writing the Constitutions of the Institute of Charity (Rosminians) at Monte Calvario in northern Italy. February is, of course, winter in Italy; it can be bleak in the north, cold and snowy! Blessed Rosmini was planning to write the Constitutions (the aims of the Institute of Brothers and Priests) in a secluded location, but what he found on the Sacred Mountain of Calvario was more like a haunted Castle. Blessed Rosmini, still a young man, abandoned his studies, leaving behind his friends and family, and set out with two companions to ascend the mountainside to the abandoned monastery where they would remain.

What did he find? The garden was a wilderness, the forest was alive with vipers and snakes, and the building was almost a ruin. We are told that the rain was torrential, the windows were broken, lizards, scorpions, and birds had made there home inside the ruin. And to top it all off, his closest supporter at the time (who had decided to join him and agreed to meet him on the 20th) arrived three months late!

So, what did Blessed Rosmini do? From this wildness and disarray, he created a humble home, writing his Constitutions or foundations with great patience and trust. He celebrated Mass on February 20, 1828, which was Ash Wednesday that year, and spent the next two months writing the Constitutions in his small, simple room known as 'La Cella' (pronounced chella), or the Cell, hence the name of our feast. Over time, others joined him. His humility, acuteintelligence, and passion for truth attracted young men and women (later the Sisters were founded, the Sisters of Providence). Slowly what is now the Mother House of the Order took shape.

Today, Monte Calvario is a far different place from those early years. The cell is still there with its simple iron bed, but the wilderness has been transformed set against the rugged surrounding mountains. Calvario's heart remains the same; a place to draw close to God in quietness, reflection and prayer, now to young men coming from Italy, UK, and around the world who are following in the footsteps of Blessed Antonio Rosmini seeking God's truth, love, wisdom and life as a Brother.

Rosmini spent two months writing the Constitutions. After studying similar works of other Orders, Blessed Rosmini's vision for the Institute of Charity emerged, he described it: "The Institute came to me one day like a flash of light. I saw it in its totality.

The work of the Constitution's detail of what had been shown me at a glance'.

What could you find in the constitutions? The book is divided into 12 parts. It opens with a very general description of the Institute: 'it is dedicated to Jesus Christ and open to any faithful Christian who is ardent in their desire to live as a disciple of Jesus' (see article 2). Typically, it closes with encouraging words and a flourish from Scripture: "struggle constantly to put into practice all the things laid down in the Constitutions. Know them well and apply them so that all will see greatness: 'planted in love and built on love, may you with all God's holy people have the strength to grasp the breadth and the length, the height and love of Christ which is beyond knowledge, you may be filled with the utter fullness of God" (cf. Eph 3:17-19)' (cf. Article No. 1068). And in between? Selection of candidates, formation, community life, and governance. Prayer, poverty, chastity, humility, and obedience. Universal works. Lofty ideals and practical details can be found! For detailed information visit: 'The Rosminian Constitutions and the Constitutions of St Ignatius'

The above already indicates an openness to all. Article 126, among others, fleshes out such a vision: "the spirit and purpose of the Institutes name from the Charity of Jesus Christ, wishes to pour out and share as widely as possible with others whatever good it may obtain by the Lord's grace." In a very real sense, following this Constitution, we can consider ourselves Rosminians. The Feast of the Cell is a wonderful time to pray for the Rosminian Family around the world.
