Dear Parishioners

The opening lines of today's First Reading from the Book of Job in the Old Testament are striking: "Is not man's life on earth nothing more than pressed service,

His time no better than hired drudgery".

Job, the good, upright, wealthy man, has had his life completely shattered, losing all his children, possessions and his health. He sits in the dust, criticised by friends and scorned by his wife. He has lost everything and covered in ulcers, he is reduced to a broken outcast.

Job rails against God but eventually he accepts that suffering is his lot which he must accept as one of God's mysteries

Why we suffer, particularly why the innocent do, is a perennial question, one that priests are asked all the time. The truth is that there is no satisfactory "pat" answer. When tragedy hits, the only response to help is silence and support. Glib answers are useless.

In today's Gospel, Jesus is besieged by the suffering crowds. He heals, he cures many. Soon he will enter on that road of suffering Himself, the Via Dolorosa, on His way to Jerusalem and the gruesome pain of Crucifixion.

God the Father allows suffering in the world. God the Son shares in this pain and God the Holy Spirit continues in the Church and the world the work of healing and reconciliation which that Calvary Sacrifice brought for us all.

Many suffer on different levels:physically, emotionally, spiritually. Christ the Suffering Servant offers us healing at the altar, in the Confessional, in the warmth of human sympathy and care. Bring your pain to Him and ask the Lord of Life to help you to carry your Cross. He will not abandon you because He has promised to be with us always...to the end of Time.

Everyone is very welcome to join for coffee after Mass, and many thanks to the people who have kindly organised this.


