There is a huge difference between what we want and what we need. St Ignatius of Loyola (1491 – 1556) was a soldier; injured - as a young man - in war he was bedridden in a convent-hospital for months. He wanted to read stories of his childhood heroes, but the nuns had only stories about saints' lives. So that was to be his reading! From it he began to ask himself did he have what was necessary to be a great saint. He became so aware how much his previous reading had provided only fleeting pleasure, but now, in reading the lives of the saints he found a more lasting, a deeper sense of pleasure. This eventually led him to the conclusion that lasting pleasure - lasting happiness - is only truly found in Jesus Christ. Today, in the Gospel, Jesus makes a great promise to us. The crowds witnessed the great miracle of Jesus feeding the them with just a few loaves and fishes. They wanted to see more, but they can't imagine how much more Jesus has to offer them. They wonder, what sign will Jesus give to show that he is the one they should believe in. God provided a miraculous food for the Israelites as they journeyed through the desert, the manna that kept them fed for as long as they needed. But Jesus promises even more. He says the food the people were looking for would satisfy them only momentarily, but He offers something that will last for ever: He is the true Bread come down from Heaven, the true Manna, that He is all the food we need to travel not though the desert to the promised land of Canaan, but through life itself into the glory of heaven. Rather like the people in the Gospel, and like the young Ignatius, we sometimes seek bread that perishes so quickly. Jesus encourages us today to work for what we need, not for what we think we want. We pray that we make the best of what we have and work for that which provides eternal happiness: Jesus, the Bread of Life.

This week's Gospel - John 6:24-35

'It is my Father who gives you the bread from heaven; I am the bread of life'

When the people saw that neither Jesus nor his disciples were there, they got into boats and crossed to Capernaum to look for Jesus. When they found him on the other side, they said to him, 'Rabbi, when did you come here?' Jesus answered: 'I tell you most solemnly, you are not looking for me because you have seen the signs but because you had all the bread you wanted to eat. Do not work for food that cannot last, but work for food that endures to eternal life, the kind of food the Son of Man is offering you, for on him the Father, God himself, has set his seal.' Then they said to him, 'What must we do if we are to do the works that God wants?' Jesus gave them this answer, 'This is working for God: you must believe in the one he has sent.' So they said, 'What sign will you give to show us that we should believe in you? What work will you do? Our fathers had manna to eat in the desert; as scripture says: He gave them bread from heaven to eat.' Jesus answered: 'I tell you most solemnly, it was not Moses who gave you bread from heaven, it is my Father who gives you the bread from heaven, the true bread; for the bread of God is that which comes down from heaven and gives life to the world.' 'Sir,' they said 'give us that bread always.' Jesus answered: 'I am the bread of life. He who comes to me will never be hungry; he who believes in me will never thirst.'

The annual Pilgrimage to Harvington Hall,

Shrine of the English Martyrs, will take place on Sunday 1 September. Mass is at 3pm with Confessions from 1.45pm -2.30pm. Free timed tours of Harvington Hall are available to pilgrims on the day and can be booked at the table in the Hall's courtyard upon arrival. There is free parking available. It is essential that you bring your own chairs and packed lunch. Harvington Hall is a house which holds many secrets, containing seven priest hides. Humphrey Pakington, who inherited the estate in 1578 was a staunch Catholic and thus subject to the harsh penal laws of the Elizabethan age. From 1585 it was illegal for a Catholic priest to step foot in England, making it necessary for Humphrey to equip Harvington with the impressive priest hides, which visitors can see today. We don't know the full story of these priest hides but we do know that some of them were almost certainly the handiwork of the master carpenter St Nicholas Owen. The annual pilgrimage to Harvington offers you a chance to reflect on our own faith and the persecution, and often martyrdom, of Catholics during the English Reformation.
