WELCOME TO MASS, September is the Month of Our Lady of Sorrows.

This month, in normal years, there would usually be three feasts of Our Lady – though as two this year fall on Sundays there is just one. This Sunday (8th) would usually be the feast of Our Lady's birthday, and the 15th (the following Sunday) would have been Our Lady of Sorrows. This just leaves the Feast of Our Lady of Walsingham on Tuesday the 24th.

Our Lady's birthday is a feast of joy — something that St Joachim and St Anne would have experienced at the birth of their long-awaited child, destined to be the Mother of God. But the Feast of Our Lady of Sorrows reminds us that Mary's vocation as Mother of Christ would involve sorrow as well as joy.

The tradition of the Church, much articulated by St Bernard, spoke of the Seven Sorrows of Mary. Sometimes statues of Blessed Mary as Our Lady of Sorrows have the disturbing image of seven swords piercing Our Lady's heart. These seven sorrows we read about in the gospels: The prophecy of Simeon at the Temple where he told her that a sword of sorrow would pierce her heart (Luke2:35); the flight into Egypt (Matthew 2:13-15); the loss of the child Jesus for three days (Luke 2:41-50); Mary meets Jesus on the way to Calvary, followed by the body of Jesus being taken down from the Cross (John: 19:25-37); and finally the burial of Jesus (John 19: 38-42).

The devotion to Our Lady of Sorrows speaks eloquently of the vocation of parenthood which can involve pain, anxiety and suffering, as well as joy. Also, it reminds us that Mary's particular vocation was as the first disciple of her Son – which included following him to the Cross.

The Feast of Our Lady of Walsingham speaks of England's ancient National Shrine – the shrine of the Incarnation and the Annunciation in which Gabriel's visit to young Mary in Nazareth is commemorated. One collect for the Annunciation brings all this beautifully together:

Pour forth, we beseech you, O Lord, your grace into our hearts; that we, to whom the incarnation of Christ, your Son, was made known by the message of an angel, may by His Passion and Cross be brought to the glory of His Resurrection.

consent for use of Live IMAGES – To comply with recent updates of GDPR requirements, anyone who is on the sanctuary must sign a consent form allowing their image to be broadcast. This includes Altar Servers, Ministers of the Word and of the Eucharist. For anyone under the age of 16, the consent form should be completed by a parent or legal guardian. These forms can be collected from the parish office or the sacristy.

LIVE STREAMING - Thanks to those who responded to the request for information as to the use of live streaming aimed primarily towards the needs of the sick and housebound. It will give us an opportunity to evaluate the various needs articulated, alongside the latest guidelines from the diocese in relation to GDPR legislation.

ST. JOSEPH'S ROOF - The diocese has now given permission for this work repairing the roof at St Joseph's. This has been increasingly recurrent problem at St Joseph's for a number of years. The roof connecting the hall and the church will be replaced, and a number of jobs will be tackled on the main church roof. The cost of the work will be £49,000. This will be a challenge for us to raise these funds, so any fundraising ventures welcome. We are also in the process of applying for grants from various bodies due to the Hall's community use.

ALPHA COURSE - Why am I here? What's the meaning of life? Ask the big questions at Alpha: every Thursday in September at 7pm in <u>St. Joseph's Hall</u>. A weekly course (9 weeks) on the meaning of life. Each session begins with a meal, then a video, then an open discussion. Second reading

James 2:1-5

My brothers, do not try to combine faith in Jesus Christ, our glorified Lord, with the making of distinctions between classes of people. Now suppose a man comes into your synagogue, beautifully dressed and with a gold ring on, and at the same time a poor man comes in, in shabby clothes, and you take notice of the well-dressed man, and say, 'Come this way to the best seats'; then you tell the poor man, 'Stand over there' or 'You can sit on the floor by my foot-rest.' Can't you see that you have used two different

standards in your mind, and turned yourselves into judges, and corrupt judges at that?

Listen, my dear brothers: it was those who are poor according to the world that God chose, to be rich in faith and to be the heirs to the kingdom which he promised to those who love him.

Gospel Acclamation

Alleluia, alleluia! Speak, Lord, your servant is listening: you have the message of eternal life. Alleluia!

Gospel Mark 7:31-37

Returning from the district of Tyre, Jesus went by way of Sidon towards the Sea of Galilee, right through the Decapolis region. And they brought him a deaf man who had an impediment in his speech; and they asked him to lay his hand on him. He took him aside in private, away from the crowd, put his fingers into the man's ears and touched his tongue with spittle. Then looking up to heaven he sighed; and he said to him, 'Ephphatha', that is, 'Be opened.' And his ears were opened, and the ligament of his tongue was loosened and he spoke clearly. And Jesus ordered them to tell no one about it, but the more he insisted, the more widely they published it. Their admiration was unbounded. 'He has done all things well,' they said 'he makes the deaf hear and the dumb speak.'
