Welcome to Mass, and a special welcome to anyone who is visiting. There are refreshments available after the 8.45am Mass in the Dupuis Centre, and after the 10am Mass in St Joseph's Hall.

This coming week there are two important dates in the Catholic calendar – one a feast and Holy Day of Obligation, the other an important commemoration – both reminding us that the Church is far bigger than what we can see.

The first is **All Saints Day** on Friday which celebrates all those who enjoy the glory of heaven. Saints comes from the word for 'holy'. St John the Evangelist simply means 'Holy John the Evangelist.' Some of these holy ones will have been canonised by the Church and have feast days. The far greater number are those who history does not recall. As the Book of the Apocalypse has it: 'After this, I had a vision of a great multitude, which no one could count, from every nation, race, people and tongue. They stood before the throne and before the lamb, wearing white robes and holding palm branches in their hands.' In honouring the saints, we give praise to God who made them so. Sometimes this day was called All Hallows – hallow too speaks of the holy – 'hallowed by thy name' we say in the Our Father – 'may your name be held holy.' Perhaps, in the popular imagination, All Hallows was overshadowed by its eve – All Hallows Eve or Hallowe'en – so it's good to reclaim this day for light, rather than darkness.

The commemoration that follows is **All Souls Day**. Often, we like to think that our loved ones go straight to heaven. Indeed they do if they are perfect – or they die before the age of reason. For most people, though, the fact is that we are sinners, and so wouldn't be able to bear the sight of the perfect love and glory of the Father – no more than can look at the sun. Purgatory prepares us, through the cleansing of sin, to be made ready for the beatific vision. In this sense purgatory can be related to pain as we see the fruits of bad actions and false treasures – to face our true selves – so that the mercy of God can cleanse us. All Souls Day reminds us of how important it is to pray for the faithful departed and offer Holy Mass for them. Also, a plenary indulgence, applicable to the souls in purgatory, is granted to the faithful who devoutly visit a church and there pray at least the Our Father and the Creed under the usual conditions. Mass for the faithful departed will be offered that day (Saturday 2nd November) at 10am.

If it isn't possible for your child to commit to this for this year, then they can delay preparing for Holy Communion to the following year. The earliest children can make their first Holy Communion in this diocese is Year 3 of primary school.

Preparation will begin at the end of November, and all dates will be sent to you once your child's application has been processed. Parents – it is really important that you do your bit in bringing the children to Sunday Mass (if you don't already). We have Masses from Saturday at 4pm through to Sunday at 5.30pm. The preparation and catechists are there to help you in preparing your children – they can't do it for you! What is important to you will be important for them – and the opposite will also be true.

'Courage,' they said 'get up; he is calling you.' So throwing off his cloak, he jumped up and went to Jesus. Then Jesus spoke, 'What do you want me to do for you?' 'Rabbuni,' the blind man said to him 'Master, let me see again.' Jesus said to him, 'Go; your faith has saved you.' And immediately his sight returned and he followed him along the road.
