## **Dear Parishioners**

This last week we have watched the inauguration of the 47th President of the USA, Donald J Trump. To British eyes, the whole occasion was strange, a combination of high pomp with showbiz, the President relishing it all and displaying remarkable levels of energy for a man now in his eighth decade. Whatever you think of the White House incumbent, he is certainly setting about his goals with energy and resolve.
