Sunday 2 February 2025 – The Presentation of the Lord Readings: Year C

## **Dear Parishioners**

The 2nd February is "The Presentation of the Lord", or to give it an older title "The Purification of the Blessed Virgin Mary". It is known popularly as "Candlemass" as the theme of Light is central and candles are blessed and sprinkled at the beginning of Mass. It falls on a Sunday every 6/7 years so 2025 is a special occasion, a good start to this Jubilee Year!

February 2nd is halfway between the Winter solstice and the Spring equinox and is held to be the "turning point" of Winter gloom. Certainly this January has been hard work with driving rain alternated by freezing cold and lots of grey skies. In Ireland it is "St Bridget's day", traditionally the herald of Spring and of course in the States it is "Groundhog Day".

What does it mean? Quite simply, Candlemass marks 40 days since the Nativity and is another Theophany, a manifestation of the Divine hidden under Jesus' humanity. Mary and Joseph are doing their Jewish duty presenting the firstborn in the Temple as all were required to do under the Mosäic Law,, and redeeming him with the sacrifice of turtle doves or pigeons, permissible for those unable to afford a lamb. Scooping up the baby,mSimeon proclaims the "Nunc Dimittis"... "Lord now lettest Thou Thy servant depart in peace..." (sorry but I do prefer the older translation). What the parents thought of all this is not recorded, but the chilling words that follow must have struck some fear into Mary's heart..."And a sword shall pierce your heart..." What sword and why? Mary would discover in time the pain of watching her son betrayed, humiliated, scourged and then crucified...but the Light did come back, from an empty tomb, abandoned grave clothes, a Risen Lord.

Our lives can be dark and painful, and confusing. With Mary we need to hang on to the promise that Jesus made to be with us, even to the end of time, even when we cannot understand or see what is happening. At times this is difficult, humanly impossible, but He will give us the strength if we turn to Him. May Mary, Mother of God, help us with her prayers.
