Candlemas Day, Feast of the Presentation of Jesus in the Temple



Five years ago, the pandemic was knocking on our door. No one had an answer. We lived in trepidation whether to shake hands or not, whether to wear masks or not. We were approaching lockdown. We listened to others hoping for an answer, an answer that would not come. As we saw lockdown imposed in Japan, we said "that won't happen here". And it did. We had to do something. We could not continue as we were and hope to avoid grave consequences. And lockdown was imposed.

Now we listen as Governments change, leaders promise and do not deliver. Francis invokes a Year of Hope. Dreadful news – from anywhere and in so many forms – shocks us but momentarily, reaching a stage where it almost fails to shock us anymore. Headlines change so quickly as if to protect us from too much shocking news. A world population cries out for peace, and no one seems wise enough to bring this about.

Gaza and Israel are fragile; Ukraine is on the brink; USA is confused; UK is unsure; Africa and elsewhere are terribly hungry for so much of life. We listen and no one offers an answer.

Today, we celebrate Candlemas Day. "I am the light of the world", Jesus declared. "Whoever walks in this light will not get lost". This was Jesus' answer, not a theory but a way of life, modelled by Himself. As we dismantle, and put away for another year, the last vestiges of the Christmas Crib, I wonder whether, with that, we lock away, also, the message that Christmas brought us?

We can shout out that Jesus is the light, but then who is listening anyway? "Always preach the Gospel and, if you must, use words" (attributed to St Francis) challenges us. Marchall McLuhan (1964) suggested that "the medium is the message" which might suggest that our medium, our way of living life, is lacking. The message is solid, yet our culture seems not to be paying attention. We must do something, must we not? Staying as we are, seems not to be an option. What do you think?

Today, 2 February, signposts a day highlighting Jesus as the light of and to the world, a human being who knew His origin and His destiny, and how to move from one to the other. Our next signposts will be Ash Wednesday, then Easter, then Pentecost, then Advent, again. Can we not rest where we are at present and not wait to be invited again? Must we always move on? After all, the snowdrops have been still all winter – look at them now! Soon the daffodils, and then the bluebells, and then all those shrubs that have rested during winter. A restless heart makes noise, while power emanates from a restful heart.

In Ireland tomorrow, St Brigid's Day, in Ireland folk are fortunate to have the day off. People are invited to "make Space for Peace" at 12noon, a peace wherever it is wanted or needed. What better time for us to join in: whatever you are doing and wherever you are and with whomsoever you are spending time, working or resting, can we each take a little time to be still (please ignore for now, at least, 'time poverty')! and just stop for a moment.

Elsewhere, the **Philippines** experienced six typhoons in a single 30-day period, triggering landslides and floods.
