Dear Parishioners

This last week, I have been lucky enough to spend time in Andalusia, that lovely part of Southern Spain that was the centre of a brilliant civilisation in the Middle Ages, when Europe was struggling to crawl out of the Dark Ages. Islamic, Christian and Jewish cultures intertwined like the flowers so abundant in that beautiful part of the Iberian Peninsula, and many great poets, philosophers and Weekday in ordinary time scientists flourished in the gardens and courtyards of the Moorish rulers. So much of Greek culture which had been lost to the West, was preserved, debated and transmitted to the emerging schools of Oxford, Paris, Padua and so many other centres of learning.

Weekday in ordinary time Eventually, the Arabs and Berber peoples were either driven out or amalgamated with the native population and the Catholic Monarchs took the last Moor kingdom of Granada in 1492. They laid the foundations for the dynamic and world-conquering Spanish Empire that spread across the Weekday in ordinary time world, from Argentina to China.

In all this, there were good and bad actions, high and low motives, acts of great charity and also evil. Time and again, killing resulted in more bloodshed, recrimination and retaliation. Are things any different in our world now? Palestinians and Israelis kill each other, fuelled by hatred and revenge. Russia and Ukraine stare at each other in mutual animosity, and no apparent peace on the Weekday in ordinary time horizon, ethnic tensions in Africa explode with displacement and horror the outcome. Can anything stop the bloody cycle?

Jesus tells us: " Love your enemies ... ".

Weekday in ordinary time This seems humanly impossible, almost an affront to natural feelings. Yet there are individuals who have shown that by the act of forgiveness, reconciliation can be found...not easy, not without great pain sometimes, but vital if the trauma is to be healed in some way. Desmond Tutu, the Anglican archbishop of Cape Town chaired the Truth and Reconciliation Commission that did so much to prevent what many had predicted would be mass killings and reprisals after the end of Apartheid in South Africa, and this is his verdict:

> "Forgiveness is the only way to heal ourselves and to be free from the past.Without forgiveness we remain tethered to the person who harmed us...When we forgive we take back control of our own fate and our feelings. We become our own liberator."

No one can tell you to forgive. We all have to find it ... and on the Cross we see the ultimate forgiveness, of God for us and of Christ for those who were His enemies.

"Father, forgive them, for they know not what they do."

Is there someone who has hurt us deeply but whom we know in our hearts that we must forgive, to find real peace within ourselves? Ask the Lord Jesus to give you the strength and grace you need, to free yourself.
