ARRANGING A WEDDING

Congratulations on your engagement! To arrange a wedding, a meeting with Fr Stephen is vital so that the canonical and civil processes can be followed. At least six months' notice is needed.

ARRANGING A BAPTISM

Congratulations on the birth of your baby! First, parents must begin the process by seeing Fr Stephen *in person* at a Sunday Mass. He can then check a few facts and give out a baptism application form. We do not deal with initial arrangements by phone, email or through friends or other members of the family, but face to face. Parents need to attend a preparation session before the baptism can take place.

PARISH BUILDINGS: THE LATEST

Last Tuesday the Combined Pastoral Council of the two parishes met with Eric Kirwan, the CEO of the diocese, being present too. The CPC will be meeting again this week to discuss what he said, having taken it in. He knows our fundamental problems. Many parishes are facing similar problems, not just in our diocese but in *all* dioceses. The declining number of priests is a real issue (50% of priests in our diocese reach retirement age within ten years: the diocese has just five men training for the priesthood). Numbers of Mass goers have reduced and their average age has got higher Dioceses too have their own central budget constraints. The Archdiocese of Birmingham *has no spare funds simply to give to parishes*: we must accept this. We are in short asset rich (lots of buildings) but cash poor (not much in the bank account).

The diocesan vision wants to see parishes liberated from financial worries and be 'joyful, vibrant communities of missionary disciples'. This is impossible while we spend so much time and effort trying to juggle maintenance needs, cut costs and manage in what will soon become sub-standard buildings. It doesn't *have* to be like that! Just to be clear, our issues are—

At Our Lady's:

- A roof that needs £150,000 spending on it
- Other vital works of £50,000 on crumbing side steps, failing retaining wall, far from level slabs, minimum fire safety regulations work in the lower hall, and creating a safe step free access.
- Halls that are not compliant with current fire safety legislation
- Much dated and worn out lighting, heating and other fittings
- The need for a footpath alongside the drive so that the step free access may be accessed away from cars
- We have funds that would go a long way to paying for a lot of this but we cannot simply empty the account for obvious reasons.

At St Peter's:

• Very limited funds indeed—hand to mouth meeting of basic running costs only

- A large hall complex that is too expensive to run (it *lost* £10,000 last year), because it is not designed to meet the needs of today, is impossible to let profitably like it was pre-Covid, and has mounting maintenance needs we can't afford
- A huge Victorian presbytery designed for three priests and a house keeper that is also too expensive to run and maintain and has mounting maintenance needs we can't afford. The parish will not have three priests for a very, very long time indeed
- A large and beautiful church of architectural importance that is now obviously well-overdue interior refurbishment costing a least a million pounds.

So, we have been asked to think very carefully about the future. What we **need** rather than what we **want** is to be key. Just like all other areas of life, parishes cannot have what they cannot afford. It would be unwise for us simply to carry on hoping for several seven-figure gifts to the parishes, so we must change things so that they are affordable, and remain so.

At St Peter's there is now the bare bones of a proposal that needs more fleshing out before a decision is possible. *Remember: no decision have yet been made about anything*. It is proposed that the presbytery be sold with the money raised going to build a new presbytery and a new hall on the present car park and hall site. These new buildings would be more modern and more modest, with massively lower running costs: we could save as much as £40,000 a year simply by doing that. Clearly, the current presbytery needs to be accurately valued and the constructions costs properly estimated. A full feasibility study would explore all those issues before any decisions could be made.

At Our Lady's things are very challenging. As has already been spoken about, the issue of spending large sums on any building is now more difficult than ever. We will be asked to demonstrate that Our Lady's is a building that is needed and it has to be financially sustainable in the long term. We may well want it to be, but aspiration is not enough any longer.

To repeat, no decisions have been made. But they will have to be taken sooner rather than later.

Therefore, we need to pray that the Holy Spirit may speak to us clearly. Many of us will feel that the loss of any parish building is bad, but if it leads to growth, renewal and confidence then the Church will benefit. We simply can't carry on as we are, but we must go forward with the Gospel for future generations. There are many, many capable and lively people in our congregations. We have inherited much and have much to pass on. So, because the Church is people not simply buildings, our buildings must not hinder our mission, but must actively serve it.
