Dear Parishioners

Last week we saw Jesus in the wilderness being tempted and tested by the Devil. This week we are on a mountain where the Son of God reveals His inner nature to the closest disciples Peter, James and John. Mountains are places in Holy Scripture where the Lord God manifests Himself in some form. With Moses on Mount Sinai, Elijah on Mount Carmel and Horeb, David on Mount Zion...the Mount of Olives is the final refuge for Jesus before His capture and crucifixion, on Mount Calvary.

Today's Gospel tells us that Jesus and the three disciples went up the mountain to pray, no doubt to find some peace and quiet away from the demanding crowds. Then the ordinary becomes the extraordinary as the human Christ is transfigured, transformed to reveal the divinity that is hidden beneath. The whole scene reads like a surreal experience, with dazzling white light disorientating the disciples, and the presence of the two great figures Moses and Elijah, representing the Law and the Prophets. Peter tries to bring some order but is clearly totally overwhelmed by what they are all seeing...and then it is over and "Jesus was found alone."

What do we make of this strange event? One minute the Master and disciples are doing what they must have done so many times, spend time alone to pray and regather themselves after draining pastoral ministry. The next, the whole world is split open and a Reality not seen before is exposed...and then the portal closes and all is back to normal. Why this now? Because they are on their way to Jerusalem and the reality of their lives will become ugly, dark and frightening as the persecutors close in on Jesus, and the Devil who left last week "until an opportune time" makes his presence felt through the hatred and cruelty of those intent on destroying the Son of God before He can complete the Mission. Perhaps this memory of the Glory that lay beneath the surface would sustain them as they watched their Master being scourged and crucified and would give them enough hope to keep waiting for Him to fulfil the promise of the empty tomb.

The Transfiguration is one of the five major milestones in the life of Jesus and at this point in Lent it reminds us that the darkness coming soon in Holy Week is not the final state, and that the awfulness of Good Friday will be followed by the joy of Easter.
